10:35 - 10:55 | Windsor Park Care Team: helping our unhoused neighbors - 20:00 min

Janis Bookout presented a pilot report for the <u>Windsor Park Care Team</u> (WPCT <u>https://www.windsorpark.info/windsor-park-care-team/</u>). The team was organized to provide a winter-response for our unhoused neighbors, and it formed in partnership with <u>Community</u> <u>Resilience Trust</u> (CRT <u>https://communityresiliencetrust.org/</u>). Janis provided the history of CRT, which started during Covid. This year, CRT is focusing on building neighborhood-based teams; CRT is building networks of neighborhoods serving neighbors.

The WPCT extended support to our unhoused neighbors January 4-10 during the period of freezing/rainy winter weather. In support of WPCT, the Windsor Park Library collected donations including hats, gloves, and coats. Memorial UMC was also a key participant in the effort. WPCT distributed hot food and warming supplies. Approximately 15 Memorial UMC members and 15 Windsor Park residents participated in the service and distribution.

Bartholomew Park has approximately 20 cars where people sleep at night. The WPCT reached out to them to care for them.

Janis indicated her goal is to empower leadership here in WP, grow the WP model, and share it with other neighborhoods.

An announcement was made that <u>Urban Roots</u> (<u>https://urbanrootsatx.org/</u>) wants to deliver fresh produce to local food banks and to serve the homeless.

10:55 - 11:15 | Building Community (Robyn Bishop & Chad Cotton) - 20:00 min

Robyn Bishop led a workshop on building community. She described the concept of "social holiness", the innate need to serve and care for others. She defined community in terms of unity, not uniformity. The WPCT winter response is an example of community and unity. Robyn expressed interest in figuring out how to do meals at MUMC for the unhoused and how to utilize church facilities more effectively.

The workshop posed two questions:

- 1. When have you experienced community?
- 2. What gaps do you see in the neighborhood that could bring us together?

Below are some responses from participants.

Positives: ECO fest, library, welcoming new neighbors, National Night Out, pancake breakfast, riding the bus, volunteering at Harris Elementary.

Gaps: Improve communication (Groupme app was suggested - it is used by University Hills NA and provides instantaneous communication); 3rd spaces - Dog parks, coffee shops, pocket parks; use newsletter more to highlight activities in neighborhood; use the listserve more; traffic on Berkman; welcome packet/wagon; connect with real estate agents to point them to resources; connecting to apartment residents vs. homeowners vs. homeless; reading to elementary kids - Harris kids are at Sims near Springdale and 12th.

Project ideas for building community:

community garden; movies; park cleanup; CRT collaboration; social; Windsor Park storytelling party; knit/crochet; AA/Alanon; Habitat for Humanity; submit neighborhood stories for printing in newsletter.
