Ten Garden Tasks for February


We are in one of the most exciting gardening months of the year. The days are getting longer, and the last average freeze and frost dates approach.

- 1. Clean up the landscape. Cut back perennials and apply a mulch-compost blend. Add green sand and sulfur to plants their soil to be a little more on the acidic side. Check leaves for signs of iron deficiency. Light green leaves with darker veins indicate a lack of iron. Green sand and sulfur will help to cure this deficiency.
- **2. Plant fruit trees.** Peaches, pears, persimmons, plums, apricots, pomegranates, and apples do well in this area. For those with limited space, or with an appetite for novelty, try a 'four-in-one' grafted apple or pear. They have four different varieties grafted on the same tree. For those without a yard, you might try a dwarf peach. They are easy to grow in a pot or whisky barrel.
- **3. Plant vegetables in kitchen garden**. Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, cabbage, pod peas (sugar snaps), Swiss chard, carrots, lettuce, and asparagus crowns. Also consider Onions, such as the white Texas Supersweet called Contessa.
- **4. Plant winter hardy herbs**. Thyme, oregano, Italian and curled parsley, rosemary, winter and summer savory, garden sage, and chives. Herbs like to have at least a half a day's sun in a well-drained location.
- 5. Plant flowers in the garden. Calendula, pansies, stock, cyclamen, violas, dianthus, bluebonnets, nasturtium, flowering cabbage and kale, and larkspur. For a great show, plant snapdragons now for April and May color.
- **6. Plant a rose**. Besides some good old standbys like the peace rose, Mr. Lincoln, climbing Don Juan, and Blasé, there are some interesting newcomers to look for, such as the Knock Out series, Home Run and Belinda's Dream. But let's not forget our charming antique roses as well. Antiques are disease resistant, hardy, and can shower our landscapes with very

beautiful, showy flowers.

- 7. Prune your roses. A mid-month activity. A word of caution: make sure you know what kind of rose you have before you begin to cut them back. Most shrub roses bloom on new wood, so a pruning will help to force new growth and blooms. Climbing roses bloom on old wood, so this means a pruning back of climbers will remove all the flowers before they have a chance to bloom.
- **8. Control lawn weeds.** Spread a pre-emergent weed killer over the yard and water it in. We recommend corn gluten. This is an effective organic pre- emergent that will not poison waterways and aquifers. If you spread it over the lawn, it will control those spring and summer weeds before they have a chance to germinate. You can safely use it in the garden or in flowerbeds.
- **9. Maintain garden tools.** Repair and maintain garden tools. Change the oil on the lawnmower, and have the blades sharpened.
- **10. Garden plan.** Put something down in a book, a diary, or even on a scrap of paper that you tape to the wall. This will help you plan your weekend activities and get your plants in the ground at the correct time of the year.

Winter Response 2025

Windsor Park has come together in an inspiring effort to support those in need during the winter months. Under the guidance of Janis Bookout from the Community Resilience Trust (see the **Meet Your Neighbor** article on page 7 of this newsletter), the neighborhood has formed a new initiative called the Windsor Park Care Team. Within just two weeks of initial discussions, the team launched a coat drive to help our unhoused neighbors prepare for the first freezing spell of January.

Kelly Overton from the Windsor Park Branch of the Austin Public Library played a key role by quickly providing central location for residents to donate



gently used coats, winter hats, gloves, and scarves. Robyn Bishop, pastor at Memorial United Methodist Church, also stepped up to help, offering space at the church to organize and distribute the donated items. Her willingness to support the effort made a significant impact.

The Windsor Park community showed remarkable generosity, donating a wide variety of warm clothing. Volunteers from the Community Resilience Trust worked diligently to organize and distribute the coats to unhoused neighbors, providing essential warmth during a critical time.

As February often brings even colder temperatures to Central Texas, the Windsor Park Care Team plans to continue their efforts. Stay tuned for updates and opportunities to get involved.

Yard of the Month: 1317 Westmoor Drive

The February winners are Christopher Crant and Colleen Berry of 1317 Westmoor Drive. They have lived there about a year and a half. Shortly after purchasing the house, Christopher and Colleen honeymooned on Corfu and in Southern Turkey. They wanted to bring the attractive hardscapes and flowing greenery to their new front yard, but they found that they could not just duplicate the Mediterranean plants here. Though the climates are similar, they are not identical. They needed to use natives that would survive Austin's heat, drought, and freezes. They found r/ austingardening and the Texas A&M Horticulture websites useful.

A brown slatted fence divides their yard with a small area near their house giving them privacy and a larger area going to the street pathway made of large concrete blocks goes from the street to the house. On one side of the pathway an extremely raised bed contains Texas Sage and Silver Ponyfoot. The way the ponyfoot hangs down the front of the raised bed reminds them of the Mediterranean. They have several Little Ollie Dwarf Olive Trees. They also have several Santolinas and Golden Barrel Cacti, a Prickly Pear, and an Upright Rosemary bush. Their trees include a Monterey Oak, a Cherry Laurel and a young Peach Tree. They were astonished to harvest fifty peaches last May. Thay also have two red Knockout Roses and several clumps of Gulf Muhly Grass.

Christopher and Colleen advise the novice gardener to start with a plan and do much online research so you will not be sold what does not grow here. Remember that this part of Austin has clay soil. Water well to get your plants established.

Colleen and Christopher will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery on Hancock Drive which does have good advice. It has great collections of plants, seeds, pots, and garden paraphernalia including gloves in various sizes. While you are there, be sure to greet their cats and admire the waterfall.

Meet Your Neighbor - Janis Bookout

Super volunteer and community organizer Janis Bookout has recently started a new project called Windsor Park Cares, providing support for our unhoused neighbors. The group is currently distributing winter clothing and personal hygiene donations through Memorial United Methodist Church and Windsor Park Library. Janis and her team have identified most of the unhoused living in Windsor Park and are making sure they can survive our weather



extremes. They ask the community to make donations and invite volunteers to join their program with the QR code on this page.



The Bookout family are 30-year WP residents and live on Glencrest. Jonathan is a music teacher, multi-instrumentalist and composer appearing in several local bands in places like Sahara Lounge. Evan is currently studying at the prestigious Berklee College of Music and Ryan plays saxophone in the Fine Arts Academy at McCallum High School. They are the classic musical family.

Janis became a volunteer in collaborative grassroots groups for disaster response in 2005 when Hurricane Katrina folks displaced from New Orleans, many of whom landed in Austin. Since then, she helped respond to Hurricanes Rita, Harvey, Florence and Michael, Winter storms Uri and Mara, and the heat

wave of 2023. Her desire to help eventually lead to the creation of Community Resilience Trust (CRT) during Covid in 2020, which is a network of many grassroots groups and organizations that prioritize people with lived experience of systemic harm in Austin. In addition to collective action projects, they have written public policy papers for Austin City Council, Travis County Commissioners Court, Austin Public Health, and local Equity and Resilience departments.

During winter storm Uri they mobilized 60 organizations and six city departments to transport unhoused people to shelters and hotels around Austin, saving countless individuals. With water mains broken, power failures across the county, and emergency vehicles unable to respond, it was Janis and her team getting help to the most vulnerable people in Austin. They provided 25,000 meals and 25,000 gallons of water in three weeks and helped transport and shelter over 300 unhoused people. This collaboration led to the Austin Weather Response Collaborative and Windsor Park Cares Team.

Janis also does equity consulting and data analysis and is currently studying for her Masters in Public Health at Boston University online program. In addition, she is the Director of Austin Earth Day, and is on the Board of the Texas EV Alliance.

Janis and the WP Care Team visit the unhoused whenever bad weather threatens. "Every time we go out, many of the people don't know what's happening with weather, and don't know the shelters are opening." City and county shelters typically shelter about 400 people. During winter they open when it gets below 35 degrees. "It's much worse when it rains or the wind is blowing" Janis adds. "There is a text alert system, but half the people do not have phones." The collaborative goes out to communicate around the city. Janis is hoping to get more neighborhoods to start their own Care Team.



There is an obvious question of personal safety, and Janis is quick to point out in her experience that it is uncommon to meet unstable or disregulated people. "98 percent of the unhoused people I help are very nice and incredibly grateful." Janis is proud of her 20 volunteers here in Windsor Park. "People care about the unhoused, they just want guidance in how to get involved."
