Sample Letter in support of enhanced walkways and bikeways

Dear Council Members Ellis, Harper-Madison, Qadri, & Vela:

I am a resident of Windsor Park Neighborhood, and I would like to advocate for transportation improvements that enhance the safety and mobility of pedestrians and bicyclists. There are several improvements that have been identified by neighbors and the Windsor Park Neighborhood Association Transportation Committee, and I would like to express my support for these improvements. Please refer to the WPNA Bikeways Vision for full description (<u>https://www.windsorpark.info/windsor-park-bikeways-vision/</u>).

I understand budget discussions are underway now, and I request that funding is allocated for these projects in the 2025 budget cycle. I have listed these improvements in order of priority:

Increase mobility and safety along Belfast Bike Trail and Bridge

Bikeways:

- A bike / pedestrian bridge at Tannehill Branch Creek connecting Mueller blvd. to Windsor Park at Belfast.
- A safer crossing at 51st & Tilley street (Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon)
- Improved Urban Trails / Bikeways within Windsor Park
- Better crossings & connections to & from Windsor Park at the edges (51st, I-35, 290)
- Reverse Stop signs on Belfast Drive.
- An urban trail/bikeway through Bartholomew Park to Tilley Street.
- A Bikeway from Pomerleau Park to Bartholomew Park (Linda ln. / Westminster / Bartholomew Park)
- A North-South Bikeway on Belfast Drive (Cameron Rd to Mueller blvd.)
- An East-West Bikeway from Clayton ln. to Rogge ln.

Cameron Road:

- Improved bike lanes on Cameron Rd. from 51st to Broadmoor.
- A new stop light & pedestrian crossing at Cameron & Glencrest.
- Improved bike lanes at Cameron & 290.
- Complete the Cameron Road mobility improvements.

Berkman:

- Improved Intersection at Berkman & 51st.
- Convert the hybrid beacon at Berkmen & Suffolk / Rogge into a stop light.
- A new pedestrian hybrid beacon at Hank's (Berkman between Northridge & Briarcliff)
- Stoplight at Berkman & Patton In.
- Safety improvements at Berkman & 290.

Our neighborhood has been making requests for these improvements for years. As the council knows, East Austin has been chronically underdeveloped and underinvested compared to other parts of Austin. Given the numbers of people in our neighborhood that walk, bike, and take public transportation, these improvements are long overdue. The need for these improvements will only increase as several large-scale housing developments (including almost 700 new units going in at Windsor Village) are underway in our neighborhood. Our streets cannot accommodate much more motor vehicle congestion and traffic safely, increasing the chances of accidents, which makes improvements for alternative modes of transportation even more urgent.



TREE PROJECT

WPNA Climate Committee is organizing the planting of trees throughout Windsor Park to create shade on city streets so that we can reduce the amount of ambient heat in the neighborhood. This project is bringing together an epic level of commitment from multiple WPNA committees including Beautification, Enlivenment, Yard of the Month and Parks.

We are looking for homeowners and business owners to plant a tree on their property within 15 feet of the street. There are many yards in WP that are a good candidate for this program. The best time to plant will be in the fall.

Your free trees will be distributed at the WPNA ECO EXPO Saturday November 2, 2024 at Bartholomew Park. The Expo is a family event with free tacos, kids activities, local business gift card drawings, climate organizations, and meet your friendly neighborhood Congressman.

Tree Folks will give you two native drought tolerant trees of your choice, one for the front yard near the street, and the other for anywhere else. Tree Folks arborists will be at the Eco Expo to teach you how to plant your trees, and how to care for them. We will also give you mulch.

We ask that you agree to water your trees every week for two years, with extra water in the summer. We ask that you plant in the approved front yard location. Tree Folks will contact you before the Eco Expo to confirm your acceptance of the trees.

SHADE BRIGADE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Be a member of our tree team. Shade Brigade volunteers will be asked to identify front yards in their designated area of Windsor Park and to approach each of those homeowners with a Shade the Streets promotion and tree adoption contract.

Shade the Streets will also be planting trees in public locations, and we will need volunteers to adopt a tree and water every week for a period of two years.



CLIMATE CORNER - SHADE THE STREETS FREE There will be portable tree watering gear available to volunteers. One such public location is along the concrete creek on Blanton Drive across the street from Blanton elementary school. Watershed Protection has given us permission to plant six trees on that strip of land. We will be identifying other public locations with your help.

Saltmarsh caterpillars

Saltmarsh caterpillars seem to be a common sight in gardens, lawns and traveling across roads and sidewalks. These caterpillars are a particular species, *Estigmene acrea*, and turn into saltmarsh moths. They are often mistakenly called "woollybears" which are a different species, *Pyrrharctia isabella*, that turn into Isabella tiger moths. The two species are related and in the same family Erebidae.



Saltmarsh caterpillars are extremely variable in color and have many setae in the late instar which creates a hairy or fuzzy appearance. They have striped or mottled bodies varying from black to brown to yellow and reaching lengths of 2.25 inches. Hairs, or setae, also vary in color and are mostly soft when touched. Hairs are not venomous and do not sting, but some people may be sensitive to the hairs.



Saltmarsh caterpillars actively disperse, and late instar larvae can be seen moving quickly across lawns, landscape beds, sidewalks, roads, and other locations. These caterpillars can move easily into areas and begin to feed on plants. Their chewing mouthparts cause damage to plants by defoliation. They have a wide host range feeding on numerous broadleaf plants including trees, shrubs, crops, and others.

Adult saltmarsh moths are medium sized and have white forewings with black dots. Hindwings are white in females and peachy yellow in males. The adult's head and thorax are white, and abdomen is peachy yellow with black oblong spots. Pupae occur in the soil or in leaf litter. Caterpillars spin a cocoon using silk and hairs from the body. There are multiple generations each year in Texas.

Management can be as simple as removing caterpillars by hand; wear gloves while doing so. In backyard gardens, this typically is a feasible method of control. Pesticides such as *Bacillus thuringiensis* var. *kurstaki*, spinosad, or botanicals can be used against smaller stages of caterpillars (these are not as hairy as the late instars), but will not kill off late instar larvae.

June 2024 Mueller Update

At the request of Mueller Master Developer Catellus and the City's Economic Development Services Department, the Mueller Commission approved a May 14th recommendation to City Council to extend the 2004 Master Development Agreement (MDA) between the City and Catellus, set to end in December 4th of this year, to December 31, 2028. Additional time is needed in order to fully accomplish the vision and goals of Mueller's Master Plan.

While the better-than-expected success of Mueller's redevelopment spurred density-limit increases that remain to be met, the project has also been affected by the 2007-2009 recession, the COVID pandemic, and recent unfavorable interest rates for construction and home sales. A few parcels of Mueller land remain unsold, and among the projects needing more time are additional affordable housing, the Mueller portion of the Tannehill Branch Greenbelt & Trail between Tilley & Old Manor Road, the 8-acre site at 51st & Berkman, and the park space at the Control Tower's base, named Roger Lavon Taylor, Sr. Plaza for the late 1980s Pecan Springs NA president who also advocated for the Tower's preservation.

As a result of this extension, the Mueller Commission's term will also be extended to December 2028, though if Catellus completes the project prior to that date, both the MDA and the Commission will come to an end earlier. Current terms for six members of the Commission, including mine and Martin Luecke's, will end on February 28, 2025. I have served longer than the usual two-term limit, so my reappointment is not a sure thing. Seven Garden Activities for June

1. Water. Early morning is the best time... otherwise most of the irrigation water evaporates. Deep soaking is best because it gives the plant a greater reservoir to draw from.

2. Native tree care. This month is already proving to be hot and dry. Remember your trees are going to be thirsty too. A small amount of rain does little to carry moisture deep into the soil.

3. Mulch. This will cool the roots and slow the water loss from evaporation. Mixing your mulch 50:50 (bag-for-bag) with compost, will add nutrition and relieve stress.

4. Slow-release fertilizers. When feeding flowerbeds and turf, use an organic-based, slow-release fertilizer. You will avoid burning plant roots in the summer heat and will have little impact on our watershed. Foliar sprays with seaweed will also help reduce heat stress.

5. Care for your roses. The first flush of your spring roses has finished. The flowering ends of the rose stems have probably formed hips (seed pods). Cut them off and there will be a new round of flowering. Also, give them some rose food. Examine them for any sign of insects, especially spider mites, and treat with horticultural oil (Sunspray or All Seasons) or Spinosad.



6. Mow high. Cut your grass as high as you can stand. Longer grass blades will help shade the turf and conserve water. Leave clippings on the lawn.

7. Add summer color. This is the right time to plant heat-loving summer color in those empty spaces. Planting in the morning and evening is best. For summer color, zinnias, purslane, moss rose (photo above), and vinca seem to be the toughest. Make sure they get enough water when they are establishing themselves. Happy gardening everyone! $\tilde{\bullet}$

Yard of the Month -1512 Suffolk Drive

The June winners are Nathan Gaar and Lizzie Chen of 1512 Suffolk Drive. They have lived there for five years.

Since Windsor Park is on the edge of the Blackland Prairie, they want to grow plants native to the area. To accomplish this, they look online at such places as planoprairiegarden on Instagram and search through seed catalogs like Native American Seeds. They have also gotten great advice from their neighbors.

In their front yard Lizzie and Nathan have Liatris, White Mistflower and Gregg's Mistflower, Mealy Blue Sage, Goldenrod, Standing Cypress, American Beautyberry, Horsemint, Engelmann's Daisy, Butterfly weed, and Zizotes Milkweed. Many of these plants are favorites of Monarch butterflies and their caterpillars. They also have several prairie grasses including Sideoats Grama, Texas Cupgrass, Little Bluestem and Switch Grass. They are replacing their dying Arizona ash with an Escarpment Live Oak.

They have been modifying their yard since they moved there. Though some of it has been hard work, they have enjoyed it. The hardest was getting rid of Bermuda grass which they solarized and dug out.

Now they only water new, young plants. Otherwise, they let their yard survive the summer because they are trying to grow a prairie.

Lizzie and Nathan will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery on Hancock Drive. It has great collections of plants, seeds, pots, and garden paraphernalia. While you are there be sure to greet their cats and admire the waterfall.
