#### President's Message

As I write this, I am soaking in the last 2024 sunset over Saturna from North Beach on Orcas Island and hoping for another spectacle. It has been a welcome cooler-than-usual two weeks, and I hope the coolness holds for the next three weeks in Portland until I return to the inevitable Austin heat.

I am impressed with local preservation and development of public lands on Orcas through the San Juan Land Bank and Land Trust. In the past twenty years they have acquired, managed, and developed remarkable trails and landbanked new public land on the island. The Exchange works with San Juan Disposal and Recycling towards a Zero Waste goal. In honor of Plastic Free July and growing concerns about the contamination of our waters by micro plastics that increasingly contaminate our waters and enter our systems, I spent a couple of hours one Saturday morning collecting "nurdles," almost microscopic bits of plastic, that are degrading into Eastsound. Working on a 3'x3' area at the water's edge, I filled a gallon bucket half full. Yes, in the global scope of the problem, it was "a drop in the bucket," but it certainly raised my awareness to a new, anxious level.

I look forward to the September 14 meeting when WPNA will host a candidate forum for our City Council District 4 and Mayoral candidates. **NOTE:** the meeting will be entirely devoted to the forum and will begin at 10:00 AM. Thank you to all who emailed your support for more, improved, safer bike lanes in Windsor Park. The bridge across Tannehill Branch Creek was not funded in the 2025 budget. Apparently, an upgrade is in the works for the crossing at E. 51st and Tilley and along Berkman Drive.

The Transportation Department is working on improvements in Windsor Park that might facilitate safer movement within the neighborhood, and hopefully the plan will take a more comprehensive view of intraneighborhood traffic and connections to adjacent neighborhoods. Safer mobility for all abilities in our neighborhood includes the massive tree planting planned for Windsor Park.

#### September 2024 Mueller Update

With the goal of keeping the bow-trussed Browning Hangar accessible to the public, a majority of the Mueller Commission voted at its August meeting to send a resolution to the City Council to consider leasing it in lieu of selling it, as called for in the Master Development Agreement. Catellus would have to agree with changing the MDA. The resolution also called for the addition of restroom and food service facilities, the pursuit of historic zoning for the property, and exploring the establishment of a conservancy for maintaining the building. Note that Catellus has been marketing the building for some time in the hopes of finding an owner who will do these same things, so without their full support, the City Council could be reluctant to respond.

#### **Garden Ideas for September**


We are entering a period of transition as we move from the doldrums of summer into what can be one of the busiest of seasons for central Texas gardeners. Some jobs for this month.

- 1. Cut back annual summer flowers, mulch, and feed. We have approximately 75 to 90 days until the first frost . . . plenty of time to get a renewed flush of color.
- 2. Gardeners still need to be ready to water their trees, shrubs,

turf grass and landscape beds. Slow, deep watering will encourage a deep root system and make your landscape more able to withstand drought.

- 3. It is time to plant new vegetables for fall and winter harvests during the last week of the month: broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, and cabbage.
- 4. Buy bulbs. The season to plant tulips, hyacinths, crocus, jonquils, daffodils, grape hyacinths and anemones is just around the corner.
- 5. Mulch all beds and trees with compost mixed with mulch. This mixture will protect plant roots from heat and cold extremes, and conserve water.
- 6. Inspect trees for fall webworms, and if you find them, come up with a strategy to get rid of them using Thuricide or Dipel. 7. Fertilize lawn towards the end of the month. (Please choose an organic fertilizer.)
- 8. Be on 'brown patch alert' for your grass, and be ready to treat this disease with the organic Actinovate.
- 9. Keep on the lookout for a world of fall bedding (annual) plants. As temperatures cool, we can begin to plant dianthus, snapdragons, and petunias.
- 10. Watch for black spot and mildew on roses. With cooler weather, these pesky rose diseases will begin to show up. An organic spray of Neem oil or wettable sulfur should help in keeping it at bay. Happy Gardening Everyone!

The September winner is Jennifer Daily of 1300 Cloverleaf Drive. She has lived there for 25 years.

When she began to plan to improve her yard, she observed what was thriving in neighborhood yards. She wanted a landscape that would succeed in Central Texas and would not require much maintenance. To do this she used a landscaper, Tony Cobble who, with her input, designed and installed the new landscape. He continues to maintain it. She waters if there has been no rain for a while.



She has Agave, Yucca, Prickly Pear Cactus, New Gold and Purple Trailing Lantana, and Sago Palm. Her trees include Eve's Necklace, a native Texas tree that has survived heat, freezes, and drought in her yard.

Ms. Daily recommends that novice gardeners check out their neighbors' yards, find out what works in their yards, and research those plants for heat and drought tolerance. If one is not a serious gardener, hire a professional who respects your vision.

# **CLIMATE CORNER - The Shade Brigade is Coming**

Expect a knock on your door the next two months from a Shade Brigade volunteer offering free trees for our Shade the Streets program. They will be carrying tree adoption contracts. You will have a choice of two trees: live oak and cedar elm. Both are native, drought resistant species that grow big and tall.

The trees come from Tree Folks through a program from Austin Energy and the City of Austin. We will be giving them away at Bartholomew Park on Saturday November 2. They will be five-gallon size. We will also give mulch with each tree.

The Shade Brigade is a group of 18 volunteers who will be going door to door finding locations for trees that can provide shade over the asphalt and concrete of the neighborhood.

We are looking for additional volunteers to adopt a tree that will be in a public space. We will be planting six trees on Blanton Drive right behind Blanton elementary school. Your job will be to bring water to your tree once a week for two years. We will give you tree watering devices to make it easier.



#### **Guinea Paper Wasps**

Guinea paper wasps, *Polistes exclamans*, are one of the more common paper wasps seen in Texas. They are reddish brown wasps with yellow markings, about ¾ inch in length with smoky wings. Antennae are tipped with orangish-yellow. The base of the abdomen where it joins to the thorax is black. Depending on the temperature of where you are in Texas, it is possible to see the wasps year-round.

Paper wasps make a nest out of chewed wood fiber collected from plant stems, fences, or other wooden structures. The nest is usually a single layer of cells, open faced, and hangs from a single filament. The nest is typically constructed

in protected areas such as under the eaves of homes, in shrubbery, mailboxes or on fences.



Mated queens overwinter in small aggregations in sheltered locations. They emerge early in the year, often January and February, and build a small nest in which to lay eggs. Colonies grow in physical size as well as number of wasps as time progresses.

Colonies have three castes: queen, worker, and males. Workers typically live about 15 days while queens can live up to 3 months. Males are produced when need for mating. There is little to distinguish between queen and worker, and workers can take over egg laying duties if the queen leaves to establish a satellite nest or dies. Satellite nests help to ensure colony survival if the original nest is parasitized or predated upon. Older workers may also establish satellite colonies as they have more developed ovaries, and once mated, can begin to lay eggs.

Guinea paper wasps are beneficial not only as pollinators, but as predators. They hunt caterpillars to feed their young. Caterpillars typically come from snout moths, tiger moths, owlet moths, prominent moths, sphinx moths, prominent moths, skippers, and white and sulphur butterflies.

While Guinea wasps are unaggressive away from the nest, they will defend their home and offspring. If the nest is in an area where a stinging incidence is unlikely, leave it alone to allow the wasps to benefit your garden. If the nest is built in an area where people or companion animals may get stung- in a mailbox, on playground equipment, etc.- then it is recommended to manage the wasps and then remove the nest.

Early in the season, when nests are just being started by founding females, it may be possible to discourage paper wasps to nest in a certain area by knocking down the nest repeatedly. This is not recommended when the nest is larger and contains multiple wasps.



Aerosol formulations- both synthetic and naturally derived- are available for paper wasp management. The nest should be treated either in the early morning or late evening to ensure that wasps are not out foraging for food. Use caution when treating paper wasp nests. Not only are you using pesticides, but you are dealing with insects that can sting repeatedly. After all wasps are gone, knock down the nest, squish it, and throw it away. You may want to clean the area where the nest was hanging to rid the area of any pheromones that could attract new wasps to the area.
