MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR - the late JOHN VINSON

There is a concrete drainage ditch behind Blanton Elementary school on Blanton Drive with a 15-foot-wide strip of green grass the length of the block. You will find four small fruit trees bunched together, two plum, two peach, almost out of place in their location between the curb and the creek. They did not naturally appear here, but here they are, on public land, and now I know why: seven years ago, they were planted under cover of darkness, without permission, and watered regularly by our former neighbor and resident guerrilla gardener from Ridgemont Drive, John Vinson.



This, apparently, was a common practice. John and wife Martha were secretly known to transplant cacti from land being cleared for development to "Little Bend" their desert garden. In his youth John occasionally used his sunflower and tomato growing skills to transplant shrubs from affluent neighbors to houses that needed a landscape upgrade.

These are defining actions for a former assistant Texas Attorney General who once published "Reported Legal Case Opinions Pertaining to or Mentioning Coleslaw" in literary journal *McSweeney's*. This might help explain his small garden pond project "A Safe Place for Toads", designed to promote egg laying and back yard singing. (I have a similar project)

John began his legal career as a constitutional litigator working with Madalyn Murray O'Hair on first amendment cases throughout the US. O'Hair famously won the Supreme Court case removing religion from public schools. John joined the Texas Attorney General in 1992 and his work spurred the legislature to pass the Texas Nonprofit Charity Care Law. Other cases included prosecuting a megachurch televangelist for deceiving donors; imposing receiverships on primate and tiger sanctuaries that were mistreating animals; and dealing with the complex probate and corporate holdings of the artist Donald Judd (credited with making Marfa the art community of West Texas).

In private practice John served on numerous co-op boards as an expert in nonprofit and cooperative corporate law. He became the go-to legal guy for the neighborhood, making his services affordable to people of all incomes. He also was known for his "P Soup" recipe, containing ingredients beginning with the letter p, his "Rabbit" series of portrait paintings, his haikus, his encyclopedic knowledge of flora, fauna, fungi, and stars, and bemoaning the dangers of global warming. Martha says John planted the trees hoping they would eventually bear fruit that could be enjoyed by everyone in the neighborhood.

Partially inspired by John's secret plan to install fruit trees in public spaces, I came up with this idea of planting trees across Windsor Park to Shade the Streets and reduce our future heat island effect. Unfortunately, John was taken by cancer a year ago. I only know his story because my next-door neighbor Gary is watering those fruit trees.

In November those trees are going to have neighbors because I have gotten permission from Watershed Protection to plant six more trees on that block long strip of land. I also have committed to watering those six trees, and ask now for volunteers to adopt their own tree in that public space. Let's add to John's legacy in Windsor Park.

October 2024 Yard of the Month - 1424 Corona Drive

The October winners are Kelly Handran and Julie Szabla of 1424 Corona Drive.

Coming from San Francisco, they were familiar with the concept of xeriscape. When they came here seven years ago, they wanted to use xeric plants. Specifically, they wanted to use Texas natives. It took the landscaper that they hired about two months to complete the work.

Now they have a Pecan Tree, two beautiful pink-flowering Crape Myrtles, a Texas Sage, a Prickly Pear Cactus, a very young Red Oak tree, Iris from one of their neighbors, Golden Crownbeards (also known as Cowpen Daisies), Red Yucca, Goldenrods, Dallas Red Lantana, and a Pomegranate.

Their favorite is a Mexican Fan Palm which has they have grown from a small pot. After a rain, the red rocks in their yard are beautiful. They have a fascinating blue bottle tree. For the times when it does not rain, they use water from a 200-gallon rain barrel to water their plants.

Julie and Kelly highly recommend planting xeric plants, especially Texas natives that will survive our heat and drought.

Such plants cut down your work.

Kelly and Julie will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery on Hancock Drive. It has great collections of plants, seeds, pots, and garden paraphernalia including gloves in various sizes. While you are there be sure to greet their cats and admire the waterfall.

October 2024 Mueller Update

Around 2011, it became evident that the Mueller-Windsor Park interface on E. 51st Street might need improvements to make pedestrian and bike crossings easier. Home Depot was built, H•E•B was underway, and the AISD Performing Arts Center chose a site at 51st and Mueller Blvd., and this edge of Mueller has more streets and driveways than all the rest of Mueller's perimeter. It was also a chance to reconsider a Mueller-side 60' setback that was to allow widening 51st for a Red Line rail extension, which was deemed no longer viable.

A 2012 City bond issue passed to fund an improvement concept for tree-lined wide sidewalks on the north side to match Mueller's, separated bike lanes and some parallel parking to encourage store-fronts on both sides, refuge medians at signalized crossings, an Art in Public Spaces installation, and a new 15' setback. The City hired an engineer, public input sessions were held and construction drawings were produced. The bond's funding shortfall were even addressed.

Then the flood plains in the area were revised to change what had been 100-year flood events to 20-year events, so stormwater management for the project had to be substantially revised. The City gave the engineer ample time to alter the drawings, but ultimately, that didn't happen.

So, a new engineer has been hired, revised plans are coming along, and per Eric Bailey with the City's Capital Delivery Services Dept. at the September Mueller Commission meeting, the project will be completed in 2026.

A trail alongside Tannehill Branch Creek as it runs through Bartholomew is planned for the future. The Creek crosses under 51st onto the Mueller portion of Tannehill Greenway, which fronts 51st Street from Tilley Street to the seven duplexes and apartments with the airplane on Old Manor Road, where it ducks behind them and then borders the CTECC complex back to Tilley Street.

The construction we see at 51st and Tilley is Catellus stabilizing the Creek's bank and installing two bridges for the creekside trail in Mueller. Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds Mueller's infrastructure, including this project, with land sales and City sales & property taxes (not AISD, County, etc.) generated at Mueller until 2032. The Tannehill Greenway continues further east along 51st beyond Old Manor Road, within Windsor Park's planning area, awaiting Austin PARD funding for development.

The Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission next meets at 6pm on Tuesday, October 8th, at the Austin Energy Building, 4815 Mueller Boulevard. Park free in the AE garage. Commission agendas, presentations, etc. are available at <u>austintexas.gov/rmmapiac</u>.




From WPNA's Enlivenment committee...

October in the Garden

- 1. Plant fall-flowering perennials Look around and see what's blooming this fall. Some good choices are Mexican bush sage, pineapple sage, Mexican mint marigold, Copper Canyon daisy, and fall asters. Don't forget to check out fall blooming ornamental grasses. Tops on my list are Gulf Coast muhly, big muhly, and maiden grass.
- **2. Prepare grass for winter** Now is a good time to fertilize the lawn. Feeding now will help the roots through



- **3. Plant a tree** Choose from central Texas's great selection of native and adapted shade and ornamental trees. Plant one of the many oaks or elms for shade. Or add color to your late winter and spring season by planting a redbud, mountain laurel, orchid tree, flowering peach or pear, or a Mexican plum.
- **4. Plant a vegetable garden** Now is the time for broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, and Brussels sprouts from transplants. Easily grown from seed are collards, spinach, carrots, radishes, lettuce, mustard and collard greens, beets, Swiss chard, spinach, and turnips. Garlic and shallots (multiplying onions) can be planted now with short day onions just around the corner in November.
- **5. Plant snapdragons** These wonderful, winter hardy flowers should be planted now for a showy late winter and spring garden. They almost guarantee a Yard of The Month sign in April. Other bedding plants to choose from are dianthus, violas, pansies, stock and flowering kale, and cabbage.
- **6. Harvest basil and make pesto** Also plant some winter-hardy culinary herbs. Rosemary, oregano, parsley, cilantro, sage, thyme, and chives love winter and can provide fresh cut herbs for the kitchen.
- **7. Plant winter grass seed** If you have a bare spot or would like to get rid of a muddy patch, sow some ryegrass or fescue. Rye grass can also be planted in a vegetable garden area to provide green compost in the spring and soil aeration. Elbon rye seed can also be planted over winter in garden areas plagued by soil nematodes (a disaster to tomatoes).
- **8. Plant wildflowers** These need to be planted in the fall. They will grow leaves and stems while the days are short during the winter and will flower in the spring as the days get longer.
- **9. Plant fall bulbs** For spring flowers, some of the best choices are daffodils, grape muscari, tulips, jonquils, ranunculus, anemones, hyacinths, and narcissus. When planting, remember to add a little bonemeal to the root zone

for some slow release organic nutrition.
