#### Climate Corner - Eco Fest Breaks Records

More than 500 people attended the second annual Eco Fest at Bartholomew Park last month, setting a WPNA participation record. The event was the culmination of the Shade the Streets program in partnership with Austin Tree Folks, which gave away 750 trees in three hours, breaking two separate Tree Folks records. Fifty more trees will be delivered to those people who signed up in

advance but were unable to attend the event.

Participants included Austin Energy, Sierra Club, Austin Creative Reuse, Tree Amigos, Austin Resource Recovery, Austin Climate Parents, Citizens Climate Lobby, Austin Public Library, just to name a few. The biggest line of people was for tree climbing with ropes, which was provided by Urban Forestry from the Parks Department using our favorite live oak tree next to the Splash Pad. All participants reported hundreds of neighbors visiting their tables.

There were lots of activities for the kids thanks to WPNA Treasurer Sam Searle, who also ran the membership table along with VP Chad Cotton. Thanks also to Mohan and Elizabeth for the Enlivenment Committee seed ball table, and Gary and Joe running the plant swap for the Yard of the Month Committee.

### A Salute to Service: Hope Lutheran Church's Mother's Day Out

Have you driven past the intersection of Northeast Drive and North Hampton Drive on the edge of our neighborhood? Perhaps you have noticed Hope Lutheran Church, perched atop a small hill and overlooking the northeast quadrant of Windsor Park. Maybe you have taken your fur babies to the dog park built on their property (the only one in Windsor Park), meandered on their gravel trail on a cool evening, or played a game of pick-up soccer or football on their field. However, chances are that you did not know that nestled within the quiet halls of the church and school, a small Mother's Day Out ("MDO") operation has been serving our community for almost 15 years!

Since 2010, Director Amy Swanks, affectionately known as "Nanny" to the children, has been providing affordable, part-time child care in the heart of NE Austin. She has been assisted by Jo Palmer, affectionately known as "Granny Jo", for almost the entirety of the program. Together, these two women have been both the heart and cornerstone of the Hope Lutheran Church MDO program and it is with great admiration and sadness that upon their retirement at the end of 2024, the program will conclude.



Over the fourteen and half years in operation, Amy and Jo have served 136 children, including many siblings, cousins, friends, and neighbors. On any given day, the children could be found creating themed art, singing, dancing, having story time, or enjoying one of the delicious cookies baked by Granny Jo. For many holidays, the children interacted with other groups at Hope Lutheran, including trick-or-treating or exchanging valentines at Seniors Active in Life (SAIL), participating in the annual Christmas program, or dancing at the luaus. Director of Community Engagement at Hope Lutheran Church, Carl Repp, says, "I have never seen a more loving and safer environment for children. Both Amy and Jo always had smiles on their faces, open arms full of love and the kids were always excited to see them, even ones that came back just to say hi. We are sad to see them go, but wish them new adventures and excitement as they begin this new journey in their life."

Director Amy Swanks has been a member of Hope Lutheran Church since 1972 and will still be around on Sundays. However, she will use her time in retirement to care for her aging family members and will miss the littlest members of our community. Jo Palmer has been a resident of University Hills for over 50 years and some of you may remember her family's business: "The Pit" BBQ. Jo will use her time to continue with many of her other roles at Hope Lutheran; she is a busy woman!

Hope Lutheran Church has been a staple of the Windsor Park community for decades and continues to offer free programs and events for our neighbors. In the spring, Hope offers an Easter Festival and, in the fall, a Fall Festival with activities, food and fellowship. They also offer regular programming, including: monthly tacos and prayer, meetings and activities for seniors called Seniors Active in Life (SAIL), and a monthly book club. Whether you are a member or not, Hope Lutheran has engaging opportunities to be a part of your community.

After the MDO Program closes its doors in December, Hope Lutheran will open its school space to Precious Jewels Daycare, offering families in the area another option to have their children attend a program close to home. ### Yard of the Month - 1706 Rogge Lane

The December winner is Charles Barnett of 1706 Rogge Lane. He has lived there for twenty-four years and has been working on his yard since he moved in. He is a member of the Windsor Park Neighborhood Association.

To save water and make his yard easier to maintain, recently he had about two thirds of his St. Augustine grass replaced with Copperhead Red Gravel.

In his front yard Charles has a large Chinese Pistache and an even larger Red Oak tree. He also has Houston Holly, a Spanish Dagger Yucca exploding out of its pot, Red Yucca, Purple Heart groundcover, Indian Hawthorne, and two Texas Sage bushes. One of his Texas Sages has the familiar gray leaves, the other has green leaves. His favorite part of the yard is a young, multi-trunked Mountain Laurel bush surrounded by Lirope, a groundcover often used to edge flower beds and sidewalks.

Like many of our Yard of the Month winners Mr. Barnett advises the novice gardener to use Texas natives or well-adapted plants. That means plants that can handle a lot of heat and be comfortable with little water.

Charles will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery on Hancock Drive. It has great collections of plants, seeds, pots, and garden paraphernalia including gloves in various sizes. They also have sunhats, gloves and sunhats for children. While you are there be sure to admire the waterfall and greet their cats. Sorry, they don't have any hats for cats.

#### December 2024 Mueller Update




On November 9th at Lake Park, Mayor Watson commemorated the 20th anniversary of the City of Austin and Catellus signing Mueller's Master Development Agreement on December 4, 2004.

The original 1961 NOEL Control Tower letters disappeared with the terminal's demolition in 2000. Catellus, who had them recreated over two years starting in 2005, will hold their 19th Annual NOEL lighting event in John Gaines Park, off of Tilley between Moreno & Sorin Streets, at 6pm on Tuesday, December 3, 2024.

The Texas Farmer's Market at Mueller has been voted by Chronicle readers as Austin's best for 11 years. Its popularity has grown since moving from the Browning Hangar to the Pavilion at 2005 Philomena Street in June, 2021, resulting in a wide area of congested street parking, impacting access to nearby homes. Mueller's Parking & Traffic Management District will be implementing some changes in the Spring of 2025, so please read and heed the signs at street parking locations. Also, consider downloading the free parkatxapp. com for information on metered street-parking and ease of payment. Off-street parking is available for \$2/hour at the nearby McBee & Simond Garages, both with entrances on Robert Browning Street. Some Aldrich Street retailers validate for up to 4 hours at the garages, so consider shopping, dining, or a movie as a part of your visit. (Note that the Texas Mutual Insurance garage only validates for its tenants, like Kerbey Lane & Rebel Cheese.)

The Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission meets next at 6pm on January 14, 2025 at the Austin Energy Building, 4815 Mueller Boulevard. Parking for attendees is free in the AE garage.

#### **December in the Garden**

- 1. Replace summer annuals with winter bloomers if the frost has burned them. Top performers are dianthus, flowering kale, flowering cabbage, pansies, snapdragons, violas, and stock. Add some rich compost and bone and blood meal to the soil to give the new plants a boost.
- 2. **Plant bulbs**: There is still plenty of time to plant those spring flowering bulbs. Look for narcissus, daffodils, tulips, anemones, ranunculus, jonquils, and muscari.
- 3. Cut back perennials: If the frost and freezing weather has damaged the tops of your flowering perennials, cut them back to just above ground level and mulch with compost and pine-bark mixed. This will conserve soil moisture and keep the roots healthy and warm.
- 4. Choose a living Christmas tree: This is the season to bring a tree indoors for the holidays. Why not choose a living one that you can add to your landscape in January. Some good choices: Allepo pine, Arizona blue-ice cypress, deodar cedar, blue point juniper, and Italian stone pine.
- 5. **Rake leaves**: Get outside, do some raking and inhale some of that lovely chilly winter air. Remember, un-raked leaves can damage your lawn, especially if they become wet.



- 6. **Start a compost pile**: Please don't send those leaves (mentioned in 5) to the landfill. Use them to build a great big compost heap.
- 7. **Move tropical plants inside... or they will die**. Mandevilla, plumeria, philodendron, ficus, bougainvillea, and hibiscus will all perish if allowed to freeze. Put them in a garage or greenhouse, and provide as much light and ventilation as possible; water when dry throughout the winter. If you can't carry them in, have some row cover (freeze cloth) close at hand.
- 8. Care for fruit trees: Spray them and look after them. Rake all leaves from around the base. Spray with dormant oil to kill scale insects. This should also be done on scale-infested shrubs. Inspect burford holly and euonymous, as they



pect burford holly and euonymous, as they are prone to this.

- 9. Buy a little rosemary tree (trimmed). They are a delight, and make nice table decorations for Christmas. After the holidays, dig it into your culinary herb garden as a center point.
- 10. **Rest on your laurels**: On those super cold days when it's too cold to be outside, curl up by the fire and reflect on your successes of the past year... and dream up some plans for 2025. A bigger vegetable patch? Chickens? A koi pond. An evergreen screen against the traffic? A moon garden? Endless possibilities.
